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## COLUMBUS BONSAI SOCIETY ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR ANNUAL SHOW

Twenty-ninth edition will feature workshops, plus more than one hundred examples of this beautiful and ancient art form on display.

Detailed plans have been announced for the Annual Bonsai Show Weekend, a yearly event sponsored by the Columbus Bonsai Society. The Society organizes the show as a way to publicize the hobby its members share: the ancient Japanese art of growing miniature trees. The Show will be held once again at the Franklin Park Conservatory and will feature two full days of events and displays. Visitors to the show will be able to view at least one hundred examples of bonsai created by the Society's members, take part in a workshop on either day and browse the colorful and exotic wares of three vendors.

A new feature this year will be guided tours of the bonsai exhibit space. Just as a curator in a museum or gallery would offer specialized information and insight about art or artifacts, experienced and knowledgeable bonsai growers will share their learning and insight in to the horticultural practices and aesthetic guidelines that go into creating beautiful miniature trees.

When: Saturday, June 19 and Sunday June 20. Hours will be the same for both days 10:00 A until 5:00 PM

Where: Franklin Park Conservatory is located on the eastside of downtown Columbus at 1777 East Broad Street. Easy access is provided by a Broad Street exit on I-71 approximately one mile west of the Conservatory. Free parking is available on-site.

Admission: Admission to the Bonsai events is free and open to the public. General admission to the Conservatory exhibits has a modest cover charge.

Workshops: Workshops will be held at 1:00 each day and have a modest charge, which provides participants with all needed materials and supplies and detailed instructions to create their own bonsai. Workshops are suitable for those with no previous bonsai experience and for both skilled and beginning gardeners.

A "Question & Answer" table will be staffed by club members. General inquiries about the hobby of bonsai, or specific questions about a particular plant will be answered by knowledgeable growers.

Vendors: A full selection of finished bonsai, plant materials, pots, tools, supplies and books will be available to purchase from three guest vendors. Our vendors this year are Dale Cochoy of Wild Things Bonsai, Hartsville, Oh.; Ken Huth, Ken's World of Bonsai in North Canton, Oh. and Gary Woods from Mussel Shoals, Al. Club member Tom Holcomb will also offer handmade bonsai pots.

Bonsai and suiseki enthusiasts worldwide are invited to attend the 5th World Bonsai Convention in the beautiful and inspiring capital city of Washington, D.C., home of the National Bonsai & Penjing Museum, in 2005. Along with co-sponsoring this exciting event, Bonsai Clubs International and American Bonsai Society will hold their annual meetings for 2005 in conjunction with the 5th World Bonsai Convention.

Honor Saburo Kato and John Naka for their vision of world peace through bonsai. Tour the National Bonsai & Penjing Museum. Enjoy multiple exhibits including I.C. Su's antique bonsai pot collection. Celebrate the 400 year-old Yamaki pine - symbol of peace.

Tree of the month

Common name: American red maple

Botanical name: *Acer rubrum*

Japanese name: Not applicable

Varieties: The American red maple like so many other trees indigenous to North America has had woefully little attention as a bonsai subject. As a landscaping tree its popularity increases yearly. One has only to look in nationally circulated catalogs for an extensive list of red maple selections and hybrids.

Advantages: As this monthly series proceeds, the careful reader can detect that more and more references are being made to trees native to Western Pennsylvania. And if a personal allusion is allowed, I began my bonsai addiction with American and regional trees and I've not found many foreign trees that surpass our own locals. Such can be said for the *Rubrum*: beautiful fall color, rich, deep; ease of digging; tolerates container growing; prunes well when following Shigo's rules; flowers well, seeds well; hardy; deer don't eat them unless starving; leaves smaller than most Japanese maples.

Disadvantages: Specimens found in nurseries tend to be grown tall for landscaping; not usually wired; rough bark occurs only after 20 plus years old; watch for leaf miners; leaf burn can occur if prolonged dry conditions persists, particularly if in containers.

Bonsai Potential: Good to excellent.

Growing location: Full sun except in August: filtered shade will reduce leaf burn.

Watering: High humus soil kept noticeably damp: do not allow to dry out.

Propagation: Seed, air layering

Fertilizing: Balanced fertilizer May through July; light applications in September until leaves drop.

Over-wintering: Not much protection needed; mulch the pot.

Styling: Informal upright by the cut and grow method, avoid wiring.
